Dear Parents,

Thank you to everyone who has started using the AscendSMS online grade book. Once you login to your account and complete the information page you should see your student's current grades. If you can't get logged in please send me an email, and I can send you your password again or help find a solution to the problem.

I appreciate any feedback that you would like to share about the program. One parent told me that it's nice to ask their student what they did at school for the day, and not accept the common answer of 'nothing." The grade book has many features that parents can customize.

Everyone who has signed into the program should be receiving email alerts for their student. The email alerts are sent out daily at 4:15 p.m. Another option is to set personalized alerts for your students grades. Mouse over your name in the top right corner and click "Grade Alerts."



The following are some main options you can choose to customize alerts for your student's account:

- 1. Choose subjects you would like receive grade alerts for.
- Set the percentage to receive an alert for any assignment that falls at or below that percentage. You can set a different percentage for each subject.
- Choose the types of missing assignments you would like to receive alerts about in addition to percentage alerts.
- 4. Set email preferences to receive emails in addition to the daily communication email. You can receive a weekly summary on the day of your choosing and/or a monthly summary on a certain day of the month.
- 5. You can also add other email addresses to receive these updates, like a grandma or tutor that would need this information to help with school work.

Make sure to click "Save" to update your changes.

# Classroom Curriculum News



#### Mrs. Lopshire - Preschool:

In honor of Fire Prevention Month, with the help of Marshall, from Paw Patrol, Mrs. Lopshire's preschoolers learned to never play with fire. If you smell smoke, what do we do? Yell FIRE! and get out as fast as we can. During a fire never hide and always have an escape plan, which the class practiced during our fire drill. When asked what you do if your clothes catch on fire; the preschoolers answered; STOP, DROP, and ROLL. To finish off the morning, we had a great time making our very own fire hat.

## Miss Kaufman - Kindergarten:

In math class this week we learned how to identify shapes. We learned that a triangle has three sides and three vertices. A circle has zero sides and zero vertices; and that both a square and a rectangle have four sides and four vertices. Waylon remembered that to tell the difference between a square and a rectangle, a rectangle has two sides that are longer then the other two, while a square has all equal sides.

#### Miss Kuhlman - 1 & 2:

Grades 1 & 2 are tremendously busy in their classroom. In Math, they are presently going over types of lines: horizontal, vertical, and oblique. They have been introduced to fractions. Today, they learned which number of a fraction is the numerator and which one is the denominator. They are also comparing fractions to discover the greater one and the lesser one.

#### Mrs. Gideon - 3 & 4:

Grades 3 and 4 did a math investigation on measurements of length. As part of the lesson, we laid a meter stick on the floor and attempted to cover it in one BIG step. Jack Schoenauer said "It will be easy to remember about how long a meter is!" Pictured is Bela McDougle trying to step a meter with Jazmyne Roddy and Delana Noggle keeping her steady.



#### 5th & 6th Grade:

Students have been studying ancient Egypt in social studies. Students went on a virtual field trip of the temple at Karnak using the smart board and Google Earth. Students were able to look around inside the temple

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and see the hieroglyphics inscribed on the pillars. Arin James said, "It was fun, and I wish we can do it again." Maggie Cox said, "I like how you could see what the pyramid was really like."



#### Mrs. Gerardot - 2, 4, & 6 Reading:

Last week 6th grade did a webquest about pumpkins. They needed to research what the best pumpkin is to use for baking pumpkin pie. They all found that the Baby Pam or New England Pie pumpkins are the best. Ask your student as to why? On Thursday to conclude our pumpkin pie research, they made pumpkin pies. Monday - pajama and wild hair day


Tuesday - wear team jerseys
