Dear Parents,

Please keep Mr. Bob Franklin in your prayers. He has been in the Paulding Hospital for the past several days fighting an infection. For those of you who don't know Mr. Franklin, he is always doing something for the students at our school. In the past, he has bought ice cream for the students, pizza, and is buying the Under Armour jackets for the students and staff. At prayer in the hall on Monday, we said prayers for him and the students made cards for him. Please keep praying for all who are sick.

Today is the Feast Day of Saint Faustina; which our school/parish derives the name of Divine Mercy. Here is a great summary from ewtn.com:

On February 22, 1931, Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ appeared to this simple nun, bringing with Him a wonderful message of Mercy for all mankind. Saint Faustina tells us in her diary under this date:

"In the evening, when I was in my cell, I became aware of the Lord Jesus clothed in a white garment. One hand was raised in blessing, the other was touching the garment at the breast. From the opening of the garment at the breast there came forth two large rays, one red and the other pale. In silence I gazed intently at the Lord; my soul was overwhelmed with fear, but also with great joy. After a while Jesus said to me, 'paint an image according to the pattern you see, with the inscription: Jesus, I trust in You.'" Some time later, Our Lord again spoke to her:

"The pale ray stands for the Water which makes souls righteous; the red ray stands for the Blood which is the life of souls. These two rays issued forth from the depths of My most tender Mercy at that time when My agonizing Heart was opened by a lance on the Cross....Fortunate is the one who will dwell in their shelter, for the just hand of God shall not lay hold of him."

Classroom Curriculum News

Mrs. Lopshire - Preschool:

Pre-schoolers are learning that earth, envelope, elephant and eagle begin with letter E. I told them that recently an eagle had flown right in front of our car. The class shouted E eagle! Great job guys!!

Miss Kaufman - Kindergarten:

In religion we talked about how no matter how we are feeling; whether we are happy, sad, mad or even scared; God is always there for us. Lots of students admitted during the discussion that they get scared by storms. So to show them how God is always around us, I told the students this short story: "There once was a young girl who walked to school every day. One day there was a bad storm with thunder and lightening. The mother of the little girl was nervous that the storm would frighten her daughter, so she got in her car to find her daughter. When she did, she noticed that at each flash of lightening the girl would stop, look up at the sky, and smile. The mother thought this was strange and asked her daughter "why are you stopping and smiling?" The daughters response was, "I want to look pretty. God is taking my picture!"We discussed how God is always watching out for us and is always there for us. Even when things might seem scary, God will always be there to help us.

Miss Kuhlman - 1 & 2:

As part of our study of animals and plants, their habitats, survival and extinction, we also looked at dinosaurs. The children wrote stories. Our first grade student, Anabelle Saylor wrote:

My dinosaur is Rose. My dinosaur loves me. My dinosaur lives in the fort. My dinosaur is good. Rose eats plants.

Mrs. Gideon - 3 & 4:

Students are studying about ancient civilizations including Greece, China, Rome, and others. Several students did research on the ancient Olympics. Emma Benschneider said, "What I found the most interesting about the ancient Olympics was how different and dangerous they were."

5th & 6th Grade:

The fifth graders have been reading the book Shiloh by Phyllis Reynolds Naylor. This book is a delightful coming-of-age story about a young boy in an economicallydepressed part of West Virginia who finds an abused dog and immediately bonds with it. Kaitlin Slade said the book is "inspirational," and KatieAnna Baumle likes when we read Shiloh in "circle-time," when we gather in a circle and read through the story paragraph by paragraph. The students are about a third through the story. When finished, the students will have an opportunity to graphically and visually display and demonstrate what they have learned about the book.

Mrs. Gerardot - 2, 4, & 6 Reading:

Sixth graders have been learning about complex sentences in grammar. All students were able to tell me that a complex sentence has a dependent and independent clause in it.
